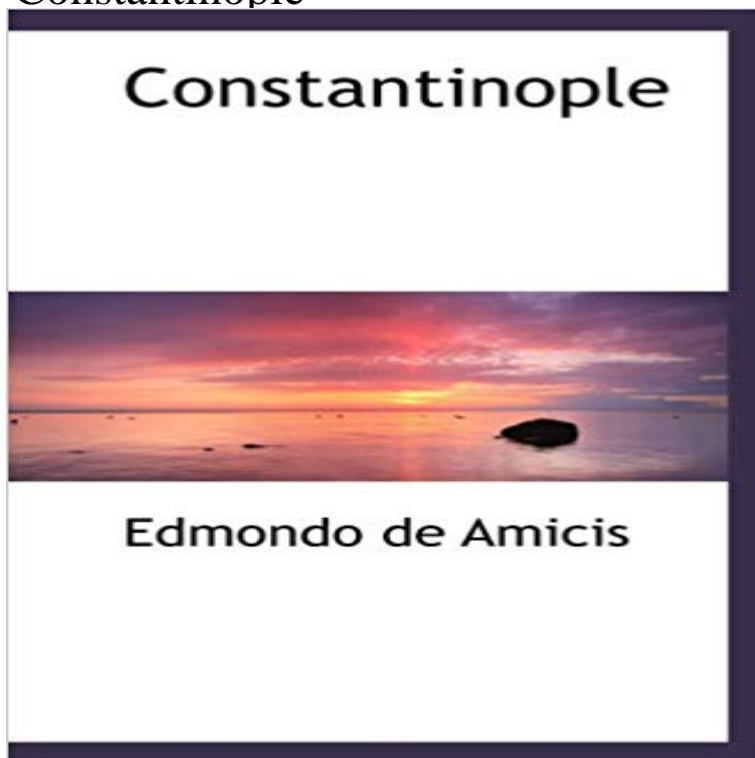


## Constantinople
